WHAT WE'RE WATCHING

Indonesia is reportedly pushing fellow ASEAN members to take action on Myanmar, which will have implications for the evolving role of the regional bloc, especially amid heightened global tensions with China. The situation in Myanmar may also prove an important test of Indonesia's leadership within ASEAN, a factor of much interest to international actors hoping for a more independent and effective ASEAN.



Global

Confirmed coronavirus cases globally surpassed 113 million, with deaths at 2.5 million.

- US Treasury Secretary Yellen took the first steps to back
 fresh financial support for low-income countries
 through the IMF.
- Two studies published this week show that the Gulf Stream system has weakened to its slowest pace in more than 1,000 years, as climate change slows the ocean current.
- The population of monarch butterflies that arrived in Mexico's forests to hibernate this winter fell 26 percent from a year earlier, with experts citing climate change impacting migration patterns.

- The WHO warned that 20 low-income countries are at risk of severe oxygen shortages. Aid agencies are ready to distribute \$90 million for oxygen supplies in low-income countries, ahead of a broader campaign to raise \$1.6 billion.
- Regeneron Pharmaceuticals said an independent panel found the company's COVID-19 antibody cocktail to have "clear clinical efficacy" in reducing hospitalization and death rates.
- WHO investigators are seeking information about a second food market in the Chinese city of Wuhan after the first officially confirmed Covid-19 case, dubbed patient zero, told them his parents had shopped there.



COVID-19 Vaccine

Vaccines from AstraZeneca, Russia's Gamaleya Institute and Johnson & Johnson fight the coronavirus with another virus, leaving scientists concerned the shots may lose potency if annual inoculations become necessary to fight new variants.

- The FDA relaxed temperature requirements for the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine after the vaccine was shown to remain stable at normal freezer temperatures.
- Pfizer announced plans to test a third booster shot for variants as well as an update to its original vaccine.
- Bahrain became the first country to approve Johnson & Johnson's one-dose COVID-19 vaccine for emergency use.
- China approved two more vaccines for public use, one from CanSino Biologics and the other from Sinpharm affiliate Wuhan Institute of Biological Products.


- **Singapore** received its first batch of Sinovac vaccines Thursday, though the shot is still awaiting approval.
- Argentina has received 904,000 doses of the Sinopharm COVID-19 vaccine, which should help the country accelerate its fledgling inoculation program.
- A new study in the New England Journal of Medicine found that the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine is protecting recipients as well as reducing transmission in wide-scale use as in clinical studies, finding that in Israeli recipients the vaccine reduced symptomatic cases by 94 percent after the second dose.



COVID-19 Vaccine

Globally, 227.62 million have received vaccinations.

Vaccination programs outside of China and India are getting underway, with many countries in Southeast Asia and the Western Pacific reporting on the arrival of vaccines supplies. In these regions, 81.76 million have received at least one dose of vaccine.







Markets

The Federal Reserve's supervisory boss said that US stimulus could conceal the true level of defaults that US banks will face.

- European stocks fell on Friday, led by miners and technology stocks, as a jump in bond yields and concerns of lofty equity valuations hammered demand for riskier assets.
- Asia-Pacific equity markets also tumbled as concerns grew among investors that the worldwide economic recovery from the Covid-19 pandemic could generate inflationary pressures, causing the US and other central banks to tighten monetary policies.
- In **US markets**, a sell-off in US government bonds sent share prices lower and sent tech stocks on their worst slide since October; the Nasdaq dropped 3.5 percent.

- The EU markets watchdog said it will scrutinize the business model of commission-free trading platforms after the US GameStop volatility.
- US pending homes sales dropped last month as the market grapples with a shortage of listing amid strong demand.
- US orders for **durable goods** climbed above prepandemic levels after a 3.4 percent rise in January.

Business

Court filings showed that TikTok agreed to pay \$92 million to settle a class-action lawsuit alleging it illegally collected the user data of some teenagers.

- Airbnb saw a 22 percent revenue drop in Q4 beating analyst expectations and outperforming rivals like Expedia and Booking.com.
- Norwegian Cruise Line reported a \$4 billion loss for 2020.
- Thai Airways posted its worst-ever net loss of \$4.7billion in 2020.
- Costco will raise its minimum wage to \$16.
- Plant-based meat maker Beyond Meats signed multi-year supply deals with McDonalds and Yum! Brands.
- Toyota said its January sales rose 4.6 percent in January, setting a monthly sales record for the fifth consecutive month.
- Salesforce posted record sales and boosted its outlook for the current year.

- China's Huawei plans to make electric vehicles under its own brand and could launch some models this year, as the world's largest telecommunications equipment maker, battered by US sanctions, explores a strategic shift.
- An internal FAA document revealed that **Boeing** was planning to strengthen protective engine covers in its 777 jets months before the recent pair of serious failures.
- **United Airlines** approved a plan to sell 37 million shares as the pandemic-bereft company continues to struggle for capital.
- Coinbase Global filed for a public offering, becoming the most prominent cryptocurrency-focused company yet to tap public markets.
- Online brokerage Robinhood said 6 million new users signed up for its cryptocurrency services in the last two months.



Africa

 The African Union will reportedly pay three times more for Russia's Sputnik V than it is paying for Novavax and Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccines.

 The Nigerien government reported that two have died in post-election violence since the ruling party candidate was declared the winner in recent runoff polls.
 Gunmen raided a boarding school in northwest Nigeria early Friday and kidnapped dozens of girls, marking the third mass abduction of children since December in Africa's most populous nation.

- **Uganda's** foreign minister "totally" rejected US assertions that its January elections were not free and fair, saying that the US "better fix its own elections."
- **Ivory Coast** security forces have seized just over 1 ton of cocaine in a night operation in a northern district of the commercial capital Abidjan.



Asia

 South Korea has warned of a worsening humanitarian crisis and food shortages unfolding in North Korea as leader Kim Jong Un grapples with the fallout from the coronavirus pandemic.

• Japan is set to end its COVID-19 state of emergency early in six prefectures.

• **India** reported over 16,000 cases Thursday, its highest daily spike in almost a month.

Thailand's prime minister said that his meeting with Myanmar's military-appointed foreign minister Thursday was not an "endorsement" of the military government. Britain imposed further sanctions on Myanmar's generals. Police dispersed protesters in Myanmar's two biggest cities on Friday, firing stun grenades, rubber bullets and guns into the air, as the challenge to the army's bid to re-impose its rule showed no sign of slackening.

China's President Xi declared "*complete victory*" over absolute poverty at a ceremony in Beijing Thursday. China is expected to reveal a robust increase in defense spending at the March 5 annual opening of parliament, as its economy rebounds from the COVID-19 pandemic and military tensions rise.

• Japanese government officials said that the Japan Coast Guard could directly fire at official foreign vessels aiming to land on the Senkaku/Diaoyu Islands, a move that comes after **China** weeks ago implemented a new law allowing its coastguard to fire on foreign vessels. At least 10 Chinese bombers took part in South China Sea exercises, after on Wednesday a US destroyer crossed the **Taiwan** Strait.



Europe

- The Netherlands parliament passed a non-binding motion saying that
 China's treatment of Uighurs in Xinjiang is genocide.
- Following Armenia's Prime Minister Pashinyan claim that the country's military is
 plotting a coup against him, Russia expressed alarm about events, Turkey
 condemned any "coup attempt," and the US urged restraint by all
 parties.
- France is targeting a fifth of the country's departments (including Paris)
 for enhanced virus monitoring that could result in tighter lockdown measures in March. The UK lowered its COVID-19 alert status for the first time since January. Poland, now reporting over 10,000 new cases, banned the use of scarves and bandanas as masks to crack down on evading mask mandates. Portugal surpassed 800,000 as the third wave of infections decline. Bulgaria reported 10,000 deaths.
- Hungary's Prime Minister Orban warned that the country is entering its hardest two weeks since the start of the pandemic; only about 200,000 of Hungary's 9.8 million citizens have been fully vaccinated, primarily using the Sinopharm vaccine. The Czech Republic said France will send 100,000 Pfizer vaccines as the country struggles with a surge of cases.
- The **European** Central Bank signaled it will increase the pace of emergency bond purchases to counter the recent sell-off in eurozone debt. **Italy's** imports from **Britain** plunged 70 percent in January compared with the same month last year as Brexit disruption compounded the effects of the pandemic.



Middle East

President Biden spoke to Saudi King Salman ahead of the release of the US intelligence report on the death of Jamal Khashoggi.

Lebanon's health minister defended the vaccination of several lawmakers outside of normal channels, which has sparked outrage over perceived cronyism, saying it was his decision to thank the politicians for passing the law that allowed the purchase of the doses.

• **Libya's** newly-appointed Prime Minister failed to appoint his cabinet ahead of the Friday deadline, raising doubts of the tenuous unity's government's chances of success.

US military launched air strikes in eastern Syria against facilities belonging
to an Iran-backed militia, in a calibrated response to rocket attacks against
US targets in Iraq. The decision to strike only in Syria and not in Iraq, at least
for now, gives Iraq's fragile government time to carry out its own investigation
into a February 15 attack that wounded Americans.



Americas

Brazil surpassed 250,000 COVID-19 deaths, the second-highest death toll in the world.
 The CEO of Petrobras officially agreed to step down, paving the way for President Bolsonaro to replace him with an army general. Brazil's telecoms regulator Anatel approved rules for a spectrum auction for 5G networks this year without any curbs on China's Huawei Technologies Co as an equipment supplier.

• **Ecuador** announced that authorities have seized firearms, cellphones, and handmade weapons following the country's deadly Wednesday prison riots.

- **El Salvador** will head to the polls this Sunday for local and legislative elections that could reshape the country's political landscape; currently, President Bukele's New Ideas party governs in tension with an opposition-held Congress.
- The **EU** retaliated against Venezuela in a tit-for-tat expulsion of Venezuela's envoy to the bloc.
- Honduras President Orlando said that antinarcotics cooperation with the US is endangered by US
 accusations that he is cooperating with drug traffickers.



Americas: US

- Nationally, 46.1 million people have received one or more vaccine doses. New infections in long term care facilities, once a hotspot, have dropped 80 percent, and deaths 65 percent.
- California became the first state to confirm 50,000 COVID-19 deaths. New York City Mayor
 de Blasio urged calm after the New York Times reported that a more infectious strain that is vaccineresistant is rapidly spreading in the city. New York reported its biggest one-day increase in cases in two
 weeks. Virginia has reported elevated daily tallies for the sixth day running as the state, adds older fatalities
 as a result of processing death certificates. Kentucky surpassed 400,000 infections.
- The House voted to pass the Equality Act, which would amend civil rights laws to include LGBTQ+
 Americans. President Biden's proposed \$15-an-hour minimum-wage increase cannot remain in his
 coronavirus relief bill as written, the Senate's parliamentarian determined, imperiling a major Biden
 campaign promise and top priority for the Democratic Party's liberal wing.
- US Trade Representative nominee Tai backed tariffs as a "legitimate tool" to counter **China's** state-driven economic model and called China a "formidable competitor." Tai also promised a new worker-centric approach to trade policy.
- **Unemployment claims** dropped 110,000 last week to 730,00, the biggest drop in new claims since August.

The change of the guard in the US on January 20 is strongly impacting America's allies around the world. Countries which enjoyed close relations with the Trump Administration, Turkey among them, are forced to adjust to a new reality in which a new US administration has a different worldview and is creating a new framework for managing America's foreign relations.

After four years of being shielded by President Donald Trump, Turkey viewed Joe Biden's victory in November 2020 with great suspicion, fearing the US under Biden will harden its stance toward Turkey. Since November, Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan has been on a charm offensive vis-a-vis the US, the EU and Middle Eastern countries, including Israel.

In remarks he delivered earlier this week, Erdogan noted he wants to forge a "win-win" relationship with the US, to end years of fractious ties between the two countries. He added that the common interests of Turkey and the US outweigh the differences between them, clearly a change of tone coming from Ankara.

The US and Turkey see eye to eye on many important global and regional issues, including northwestern Syria, Libya and the Caucus states. Nevertheless, while geo-strategic considerations inside the framework of NATO and beyond require close cooperation and coordination between the US and Turkey, their bilateral agenda is filled with irritants, which overshadow the positive aspects of the relationship. If the two countries were to reset their relations, they would need to address these outstanding issues, finding common ground or agreeing to disagree.

The problems which strained the relationship during Trump's final year in office continue to persist in Biden's first month in office and are far from being resolved.

Russian S-400 Missile Defense System

The Turkish purchase of the S-400 surface-to-air missile system from Russia, continues to be the number one issue on the US-Turkey agenda, and it remains far from being resolved. Shortly after signing



the deal with Russia in July 2019, Turkey was removed from the F-35 fighter jet eight-country core group program, due to concerns the S-400's radar systems could gather data on the F-35's. Moreover, Congress voted on imposing sanctions on Turkey based on the CAATSA (Countering America's Adversaries legislation and in December 2020, the Trump Administration went ahead and applied a limited set of sanctions on the Turkish defense industry.

Turkish Minister of Defense Hulusi Akar hinted earlier this month that there may be a solution to this problem if the US will consider ending its support to the Syrian Kurdish groups aligned with the PKK. In response to Akar's comments, State Department spokesman Ned Price said the US will not lift sanctions on Turkey until it ends its possession of the S-400. systems.

Furthermore, this week, Pentagon spokesman John Kirby urged Ankara to take action and remove the missiles from Turkish territory, asserting the S-400 pose a security threat to NATO defense systems deployed in Turkey. Asked about a possible compromise, Kirby noted there has not been any change in Turkey's position on the issue, as the Turkish government is pursuing talks with Russia over the

purchase of a second batch of S-400 systems. He also detailed past US offers to supply Turkey NATO-compatible Patriot missile defense systems, which were declined by Turkey.

This week, the Turkish defense industry hired the Washington lobbying firm Arnold & Porter, seeking its strategic advice on returning to the F-35 program. Turkey's conciliatory tone toward Israel is also partly seen as a way of gaining favor with the pro-Israel lobby in Washington, hoping to create a more friendly environment toward Turkey in Congress. It remains to be seen if these efforts have a positive effect on US decision makers.

Syria

Policy on Syria is another bone of contention between Washington and Ankara, and specifically over US support for the Kurdish militias in northeastern Syria (YPG and PYD), which Turkey regards as terrorist groups aligned with the PKK.

This issue has been a burden on the relationship for the last four years and has erupted periodically when Erdogan needed to register



a grievance regarding US policy. The death of 13 Turkish hostages held by the PKK in Iraq during a failed Turkish rescue operation earlier this month, drew at first a cautious US condemnation of the PKK. The US statement triggered a harsh Turkish response, with Erdogan describing it as "ridiculous," and calling on the US to stop siding with terrorists, if it wishes for the alliance to continue. In a phone call the next day between Secretary of State Anthony Blinken and his Turkish counterpart Mevlut Cavusoglu, Blinken sternly condemned the "PKK terrorists" for the murders.

While Washington sees the Syrian Kurds as allies in the fight against the Islamic State and partners in stabilizing northeastern Syria, Turkey insists US stop providing support for and cooperation with these militias. The Biden Administration is yet to decide how to conduct relations with the Syrian Kurds, given Turkish sensitivity. At this point a quid pro quo between the two countries (as hinted by Defense Minister Akar), which will include the Turks walking back the S-400 deal in return for the US ending its support for the Syrian Kurds seems unlikely but may be brought to the table at a later stage.

It is important to note that in other areas of Syria and on issues which are not connected to Syrian Kurds and northeastern Syria, cooperation between the US and Turkey is going well, including coordination between the defense establishments and militaries.

Halkbank Scandal

The 2019 indictments by a New York court of Turkey's state-owned Halkbank in an Iran sanctions evasion scheme, remains an irritant in the American-Turkish relationship. In October 2020, a New York judge refused to dismiss Halkbank's indictments, and the sentencing is expected in the coming months.

A related case filed against Halkbank, by 876 victims of attacks by groups linked to Iran, has been dismissed this week by a New York Court. The dismissal was conditioned on the two sides reaching an agreement by March 20 to carry out the case in Turkey.

Halkbank's indictment may extend beyond the US court system, and the government in Ankara is very concerned over this issue, as there is a chance it may lead to additional US sanctions against Turkey in the near future.



The ills of Turkish illiberal democracy vs. the Gulen Extradition

A major concern for the Turkish government is the emphasis the Biden Administration places on issues of democracy and human rights. During the Trump presidency it was clear the US had no intention of conditioning US policy toward Turkey on Turkish steps to change and improve their handling of these issues.

Early in the Biden presidency, several days after the inauguration, the Biden Administration rebuked Turkey and urged it to release Osman Kavala, a prominent Turkish civil society leader, and also criticized homophobic rhetoric by Turkish authorities in a crackdown on student demonstrators. Those statements were in line with Biden's vow to promote democratic values and protect human rights, and they have alarmed Turkish decision makers which understand this is just the beginning.

President Erdogan on his part has continued to demand that the US extradite Fethullah Gulen to Turkey. Erdogan accused Gulen, who has been living in self-imposed exile in the US, of masterminding the failed military coup in July 2016. While the US government clarified

no representations to same.

the Turkish extradition request will be reviewed by a US court, Turkey has continued to accuse the US of being complicit in the coup attempt in support of the Gulen movement. Tens of thousands of military personnel and civil servants have been arrested or fired over alleged links to the outlawed Gulen movement in the aftermath of the coup. This week, Turkish security forces arrested 130 soldiers in operations across Turkey's 47 provinces for alleged ties to the movement. This irritant in the relationship also remains unresolved.

Conclusion

The new Secretaries of State and Defense have already spoken on the phone with their Turkish counterparts. President Biden is yet to make a call to President Erdogan. Considering all the irritants on the bilateral agenda, relations between the two countries will need to be carefully managed. As these issues are far from being resolved, mending the relationship will require good will, patience and compromises. It is not clear at all whether the two governments are up to the task.






Coronavirus Condition Updates


As of 2100 hours US EDT on February 25, 2021






