# Global

Global new coronavirus infections continued a strong downward trend and new deaths appear to have peaked as the world braces in the race to roll out vaccines against the threat of a new spike driven by highly infectious UK, South African and Brazilian variants.

- The UN Security Council held a teleconference on the Myanmar coup but stopped short of issuing a statement of condemnation; talks among UNSC members are said to continue. Ahead of the meeting, China urged the UN to avoid escalating tensions in Myanmar.
- The WHO team investigating the origins of coronavirus has visited a Wuhan laboratory that has become the focus of theories suggesting a leak was responsible for the pandemic.

- People who have previously had coronavirus are unlikely to be **reinfected** for at least half a year, according to research published on Wednesday.
- With migrants and the jobless frequently being targets for human traffickers globally, the UN Office on Drugs and Crime said that economic fallout from the coronavirus pandemic has exposed millions more to the risk.



# **COVID-19 Vaccine**

# UK's GlaxoSmithKline and Germany's CureVac will work together on a new generation of COVID-19 vaccines to tackle emerging variants of the virus that have shown some resistance to existing ones.

- A peer-reviewed study found that Russia's Sputnik V vaccine to be 91.6 percent effective.
- A single dose of the Oxford/AstraZeneca coronavirus vaccine is 76 percent effective from three weeks to 12 weeks after the injection, according to an analysis of trial data that could boost confidence in the UK's decision to delay second doses and vaccinate more people more quickly.
- each recommended the **Oxford-AstraZenec**a shot for under 65s only, due to lack of trial data on elderly recipients; the UK government disagrees, saying it has. a "high degree of confidence" that the Oxford/AstraZeneca coronavirus vaccine works for all ages.


- A study by Public Health England suggests that the UK variant has acquired a mutation that may make vaccines less effective.
- Moderna asked US regulators to allow it to increase the doses permitted in a single vial of vaccine, a move intending to clear a manufacturing bottleneck.
- China has pledged 10 million doses of its home-developed coronavirus vaccines for the WHO's Covax scheme to inoculate low-income countries; China is providing vaccines as aid to 13 developing countries, including Nepal, the Philippines, Myanmar, Sierra Leone, Zimbabwe and Equatorial Guinea.



# **COVID-19 Vaccine**

Globally, 103.81 million have received vaccinations.

Much of the Middle East has yet to start vaccination programs, including Iran and Lebanon which have the highest numbers of active cases. Qatar, Jordan and Pakistan have begun vaccination programs but are not yet reporting statistics.





# **Markets**

# Alibaba Group Holding Ltd. plans to sell billions of dollars of bonds, in what will be a test of investor appetite after the e-commerce giant's recent run-ins with Chinese authorities.

- World shares rose on Wednesday as volatility caused by a retail trading frenzy on Wall Street subsided on expectations of tougher regulation, while optimism about US fiscal stimulus also supported sentiment.
- Oil prices rose to their highest levels in almost a year Tuesday, driven by hopes for a US stimulus package.
- US stocks closed higher Tuesday ahead of earnings announcements from tech giants Amazon and Google. GameStop shares fell sharply, losing more than half of their value, as other Reddit-favored stocks also saw heavy losses.
- Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen has called a meeting with top financial regulators to discuss recent volatility in financial markets related to GameStop



# Business

# Jeff Bezos will step down as Amazon's CEO, to be replaced by Andy Jassy, the chief of Amazon's cloud computing division.

- **ExxonMobil** reported its first annual loss, totaling \$22 billion, capping 12 months of COVID-19 crisis for the energy sector.
- Chipotle missed quarterly estimates as COVID-19 related costs continued to weigh on the chain.
- **Santander,** the eurozone's largest retail bank, has reported its firstever annual loss following provisions for bad loans during the pandemic and writedowns in the value of some of its businesses.
- Spanish oil and gas company **Repsol** has hired **JPMorgan** as an investment bank to spin off its renewable unit as early as June.
- An unexpected recovery in Q4 advertising boosted Google's ad revenue by 23 percent, sending stocks up in after-market trading.
- **Amazon** reported its third consecutive record profit and quarterly sales above \$100 billion for the first time.

- **Tesla** is recalling about 135,000 luxury cars over tough-screen failures, one of the company's largest safety actions to date.
- Mazda Motor Corp is considering cutting its global output by 34,000 vehicles in February and March due to a chip shortage.
- Under Armour is ending its on-field licensing contract with the National Football League, the company said, in the US sportswear brand's latest retreat from its marketing commitments and a move that reduces its presence in America's most popular sport.
- Germany will create a new financial task force dedicated to auditing companies suspected of fraud, part of reforms that have come after the Wirecard scandal.
- Tencent Holdings Ltd on Wednesday named 37 companies it had blacklisted from future contracts and said it has fired more than 100 staff over embezzlement and bribery incidents.

# **Africa**

- **Gabon's** ruling party won an overwhelming majority in midterm senatorial elections.
- Rhino poaching in South Africa declined by a third due to COVID-19 restrictions.
- Tigrayan opposition parties asserted that over 50,000 civilians have been killed in the conflict with **Ethiopia's** central government.
- Tanzania's government said that it has no plans to accept vaccines, days after the country's president called the vaccines an "experiment" by the west being tested upon Africans.



# Asia

- China's Ministry of Education banned the use of mobile phones in schools to crack down on "internet and games addictions."
- Fires in Perth, **Australia**, have burned 71 homes and forced hundreds into evacuation centers amid a local COVID-19 lockdown.
- Singapore has issued an interim authorization to use Moderna's Covid-19 vaccine in individuals aged 18 and above.
- Malaysia is extending its near-nationwide movement control order (MCO) to February 18 as infection rates remain high.
- Japanese PM Suga announced that the state of emergency in Tokyo and nine other prefectures would be
  extended through March 7. BioNTech said it is confident its vaccine will be delivered to Japan soon after its approval,
  which is expected in mid-February.
- On Tuesday, **Myanmar's** banks reopened, and internet connections were restored. National flights will resume but only for "relief" purposes. Supporters of Myanmar's ousted NLD party launched online campaigns, banged pots, and promised civil disobedience, but avoided rallying in the streets amid fears about COVID-19 and military response. The **US** officially said the military takeover constituted a coup and said it has been unable to contact Aung San Suu Kyi since Monday. Myanmar police have filed charges against Aung San Suu Kyi for illegally importing communications equipment and she will be detained until Feb. 15 for investigations, US Senate Republican Leader McConnell voiced support for Myanmar sanctions.







# Europe

- Russian dissident Alexei Navalny was sentenced to 3.5 years in prison for breaking parole, prompting renewed anti-government protests over his detention. Western leaders quickly condemned the sentence. Protest monitoring group OVD-Info said Russian authorities detained over 900 people at pro-Navalny protests Tuesday.
- Talks to rebuild Italy's governing coalitions have broken down, promising continued political uncertainty for the country. Italian President Mattarella is expected to ask former ECB president Mario Draghi to begin talks on forming a new unity government.
- Inflation in the **eurozone** has shot up to its highest level since before the coronavirus pandemic hit last year, ending a five-month spell of falling prices. Economic activity in the **UK** last month fell at its sharpest rate in eight months, placing the economy at risk of a first-quarter contraction.
- **Britain** has asked for an extension from the **EU** until 2023 of a grace period on checks that would be conducted on trade moving between Northern Ireland and the rest of the United Kingdom to soften the Brexit impact on the province. As part of the Brexit deal, the two sides agreed a three-month grace period on checks on food goods being moved by supermarkets and some wholesale groups from Britain to Northern Ireland.
- **German** Chancellor Merkel discussed the possibility of allowing vaccinated Germans to have certain privileges over those who refuse to take the shot. **French** President Macron said that vaccines will be available to all French people by the end of the summer. British WWII veteran Tom Moore, who rose to international fame for his charity fundraising during the **UK's** first lockdown, died from COVID-19. The Scottish government will introduce a COVID-19 quarantine program for all overseas arrivals. **Denmark** is to launch a coronavirus passport by the end of this month and aims to have a full digital version working by the summer.



# Middle East

- **Egypt** received its first shipment of AstraZeneca-Oxford vaccine.
- Saudi Arabia will suspend entry for travelers from 20 high-risk countries from today.
- Pakistan launched its vaccination drive with 500,000 Sinopharm doses donated by China. Pakistan aims to inoculate one-third of population by the end of year.
- The IAEA reported that Iran has begun enriching uranium in a second centrifuge in the Natanz plant, in further breach of its nuclear deal. Iran will allow the crew members of a South Korean vessel it seized last month for alleged pollution to leave the country.
- Efforts by the **Libyan** Political Dialogue Forum to elect a three-member Presidency Council will move to the next stage after none of the candidates secured the required 70 percent of the vote during a meeting in Geneva on Tuesday.
- The Arab Parliament condemned **Kosovo's** decision to move its embassy to Jerusalem, which recognized the disputed city as the capital of **Israel**. Unlike Kosovo's, those who were part of the Abraham Accords the **UAE**, **Bahrain**, **Morocco and Sudan** have all said their diplomatic missions will remain in Tel Aviv, in line with a global consensus against recognizing Jerusalem as Israel's capital until the Palestinian conflict is resolved.



# **Americas**

- Canada will produce the Novavax vaccine, which still awaits Canadian regulatory approval, in a new Montreal facility.
- **Mexican** officials said the country is on the verge of approving Sputnik V, as Mexico signed a contract for 7.4 million doses of Sputnik V to be delivered between February and April.
- Peru approved the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine.
- The **Brazilian** company that will manufacture Sputnik V said regulatory approval in Brazil is expected within the week. A more transmissible strain of coronavirus linked to an explosion of infections in the Amazonian city of Manaus is believed to be spreading throughout Brazil, where it could become the main variant.
- Migrant remittances to **Mexico** rose 11.4 percent in 2020 to a record \$40 billion, per Mexico's central bank.
- **Puerto Rico** is set to receive over \$6 billion in federal aid from the US to help rebuild and prepare for future natural disasters.
- A group of NGOs said that persecution of activists increased 157 percent between 2019 and 2020 in Venezuela.



# **Americas: US**

- As of yesterday, 26.8 million Americans have received at least one dose of vaccine. The Biden Administration said it would ship vaccines directly to pharmacies to ramp up distribution, with injections beginning at pharmacies on February 11. Some states chose to end partnerships between nursing homes and pharmacies, the Pharmacy Partnership for Long-Term Care Program, citing over-allocation and some lack of access. New virus infections and hospitalizations continued to trend down; deaths remain elevated, while showing signs of peaking. The spread of coronavirus variants in the US has prompted some public health experts to recommend doubling up face coverings or donning medical-grade masks.
- The Senate confirmed Alejandro Mayorkas as DHS secretary and Pete Buttigieg as Transportation Secretary. Democrats, took the first step to push through a \$1.9 trillion coronavirus spending package via budget reconciliation. Key Republican leaders are seeking to marginalize Rep. Marjorie Taylor Greene (R-GA) as extreme while shoring up support for Rep. Liz Cheney (R-WY), who voted to impeach former president Donald Trump. House Republican lawmakers are also seeking to oust Rep. Ilhan Omar (D-MN) from her committee assignments for anti-Semitic comments.
- The Biden Administration reversed several Trump-era immigration orders, including a policy that facilitated family separation, and will order a wholesale review of Trump's **immigration policies**.
- President Biden will issue an executive order requiring government review of critical supply chains, in order to ensure
  the US is not overdependent on other countries, including China. Suspected Chinese hackers reportedly used a flaw in
  SolarWinds software to break into US government computers in 2020.



### **Emerging & Existing Hotspots: Implications of Navalny's Arrest**

A second wave of protests has swept across Russia in response to the arrest of anti-corruption investigator and opposition politician Alexey Navalny. Analysts believe that the Kremlin's heavy-handed response reveals the extent to which they are worried about this movement growing, especially in light of recent popular anti-government protests in Belarus, Ukraine, and Central Asia. The fear of a "color-revolution" within Russia remains pervasive among top leadership in the Kremlin, which appears eager to stomp out any embers of a protest movement rather than let itself burn out.

The nationwide demonstrations occurred in over 85 cities, which led to Russian authorities detaining more than 5,000 people, according to independent monitoring groups. Protestors across the country were met with unexpected levels of violence from police and security forces, including previously unforeseen tactics such as the use of electric tasers on women and children. While Moscow's eagerness to clamp down on unrest is not new, the harshness of the techniques and methods is unprecedented in recent history. Furthermore, reporting from Russia over the last several days indicates that those arrested at the protests are facing severe charges and punishments in an effort to deter future demonstrations, including spells in the state prison system formerly known as the gulag.

On Tuesday, Navalny himself was sentenced by Moscow court to just under three years in prison for breaking the terms of his parole while recuperating in Germany from being poisoned. The decision to jail Navalny is already re-energizing the protest movement in the short term, especially as it represents the first lengthy sentence handed down to the popular anti-corruption figure. It is likely that the Kremlin has anticipated further mobilization of the opposition movement - what leadership in Moscow might not have expected is the extent and coordination of the international community's response. Within hours, US Secretary of State Tony Blinken, French President Emmanuel Macron, UK Foreign Minister Dominic Raab, and German Chancellor Angela Merkel all released statements condemning the

imprisonment of Navalny and calling for his immediate release. EU leadership, backed by the US, appears to be coalescing around the threat of new and more targeted sanctions on Russian and Kremlin leadership. While Moscow had mostly adapted to the international sanctions regime since the annexation of Crimea in 2014, the coronavirus pandemic has placed unprecedented strains on the Russian economy and subsequently, their ability to deal with domestic public health crises and budget shortfalls. This in turn has changed the calculus in US and EU thinking, and whether or not a new round of sanctions would have a significant effect in changing the Kremlin's behavior both domestically and abroad.

The arrest and detention Navalny is far from the only sticking point in worsening Russian relations with the West. Although Washington and Moscow have recently agreed to a clean five-year extension of the New START arms control treaty, any significant coordination on international security issues is likely to begin and end there for the foreseeable future. The Biden Administration views the arms control agreement as a security imperative, and not as a basis for future cooperation. Elsewhere, President Biden himself has requested a comprehensive intelligence review of the SolarWinds cyberattack on

federal government infrastructure, the results of which will likely require additional punitive actions towards Moscow. Under pressure from Washington, completion of the Nord Stream II pipeline now appears to be in jeopardy, as France has now joined the US in calling for the project to be abandoned in the wake of the Navalny protests. In contrast to the previous four years, the Biden Administration's approach to Russia, both rhetorically and in action, will be highly coordinated with European and international allies, especially as it pertains to perceived human rights violations. This new focus will not only characterize bilateral relations between Washington and Moscow (limited as they are in scope), but also have ripple effects in seemingly unrelated issues such as world energy markets and US power projection in Central and Latin America. President Biden and his national security team already appear to have learned their lesson from the failed Obama Administration "reset" with Russia in 2009-2010: the scope of shared interests between Washington and Moscow is increasingly narrow, and is unlikely to change as long as President Putin remains in power.




As of 2100 hours US EDT on February 2, 2021






