# 'No Meetings' Week

Following the success of last December's "No Meetings Week," Dentons once again encouraged all lawyers, professionals and business services staff to review and cancel all routine and non-critical meetings during the last week of April in order to create space to complete work or simply take a mental health break.

In announcing the respite, the Firm stated, "Our leadership team is cognizant that our continued virtual world has its limitations, and while there remains a premium on connectivity, our ability to give each other space will help offset the pressure and burnout that many are feeling in the demands of our remote work."

There were exceptions for teams working to hit hard deadlines, closing deals, supporting critical client needs or advancing our essential priorities.

Law.com caught wind of the initiative and was intrigued, writing, "It's one of a number of measures law firms are experimenting with to address the fatigue connected with the blurring of boundaries between home life and work that's been a hallmark of the pandemic," adding that Dentons was "following the lead of others in corporate America."

Law.com also noted that while most standing meetings suspended for a week in December did return in January, the success of the exercise "prompted some organizers to reduce their duration or replace some larger meetings with smaller group sessions or individual check-ins.

# Jacob Rooksby

Dean, Gonzaga University School of Law

In June 2018, after three years serving as of counsel with the Intellectual Property practice at Cohen & Grigsby (now Dentons Cohen & Grigsby) while simultaneously serving as a professor of law and, ultimately, Associate Dean of Administration, at Pittsburgh's Duquesne University School of Law, Jacob relocated to Spokane, WA, to devote his full energies, interests and abilities to Gonzaga University School of Law, where he also wears multiple hats, including Dean of the 400+ student law school with 65+ full-time faculty; President of the Gonzaga Law School Foundation, which oversees \$30 million in assets; and Professor of Law and Leadership Studies, conducting classes in intellectual property law, technology transfer, higher education law and torts.

#### What does an average day look like for you?

What I love about the job is the variety. I work with a variety of stakeholders in the university community – from faculty, to students, to other administrators, to alumni, local judges and attorneys, and trustees. No two days are the same, which is what I love about it.

#### What was it about Gonzaga that appealed to you?

I attended a Jesuit high school in Indianapolis, and the Jesuit approach to education was something that had a profound influence on me at a young age. A sense of wanting to get back to that kind of environment was what drew me to explore the opportunity at Gonzaga.

#### What do you enjoy most about your work there?

I enjoy getting to be on the ground-level of shaping educational policy and helping students prepare for the profession. It's very rewarding.

# What are the toughest problems and decisions you handle?

Because of the many stakeholders in higher education, it is often impossible to make everyone happy, particularly the more important the problem or decision is. Standing firm in making what you believe to be principled decisions, in the face of varied and sometimes vocal feedback from stakeholders, is one of the perpetual challenges of the position.

### In what ways did your time at Cohen & Grigsby prepare you for what you are doing today?

Cohen & Grigsby brought me in as somewhat of a "special teams" player who wasn't on the traditional associate-to-partnership track. That meant I had to work collaboratively across departments and groups in a unique way that gave me foundational experience for a lot of the coalition-building and collaborative work I do now.

### Tell us about a few of your favorite memories of the firm?

Jennifer Park brought me in to assist on an employment litigation matter that had a copyright component to it. I had the chance to take the opposing party's deposition and participate in the mediation. It was fun to get to participate again in high-stakes litigation, even while a full-time professor, and working with Jen was a blast.

I also remember fondly the many "road shows" that Noland [Cheung, chair of Dentons Cohen & Grigsby's Intellectual Property National Practice group] and I did for clients on site at their places of work, educating them about IP law. Noland is unlike any other IP attorney I have ever met – he has a way of making complex IP issues digestible for clients, and his enthusiasm for the subject matter is infectious and unparalleled. Working alongside him has been one of the great honors and fun times of my career.

### Are there any aspects of working in a law firm that you miss?

I have joined an IP boutique in Spokane, called FIG. 1 Patents, PLLC, on a freelance basis, so I still have the occasional opportunity to practice. But what I miss about Cohen & Grigsby is the firm's culture and approach to relationship-building with clients in the community and region. It's really quite special and unique what Cohen & Grigsby represents, in terms of community standing, depth and breadth of practice, size, value to clients, and the sophistication of matters the firm handles.

### Do you have advice for lawyers who are interested following a similar career path?

Consider teaching a course as an adjunct professor. It's the best way to learn whether a career in higher education is really what you would like to pursue. And don't be turned off by some of the unusual things that can happen in higher education. The power structures are very horizontal, and the decision-making is diffuse and often slow. Those aspects of the sector can be viewed as defects, but also as features.

### What do you like to do outside of work? Any special interests?

I really enjoy camping and hiking with my wife and daughter. We have an Airstream travel trailer and use it often in the beautiful Pacific Northwest. The ease of accessibility to all things outdoors is one of the great things about living in Spokane. The motto of the city is "Close to Nature, Close to Perfect," and I have come to understand why.

#### How has the pandemic affected you and your work?

Like many, we were on seemingly endless Zoom meetings for months on end. However, Gonzaga University was one of the few institutions in our region to resume in-person operations in August 2020. It wasn't perfect, and we learned a lot in the process, but we got through it, and in fact find ourselves in a position of strength coming out of the pandemic, with record enrollments both at the law school and undergraduate campus. Now all we need in 2022 is a national basketball championship! That would really be the cherry on top. We came oh-so-close last year.

### **Success Stories**

- Trade secret misappropriation settlement: In the International Trade Commission's largest-ever trade secret case—and arguably the largest IP case in history in terms of potential damages—a team from Washington, DC, Atlanta and Chicago filed a complaint on behalf of Korea's largest chemical company against its largest competitor for trade secret misappropriation relating to electric vehicle lithium-ion batteries. After securing limited-exclusion and cease-and-desist orders relating to batteries, battery cells, battery modules, battery packs, and components thereof and processes therefor, the defendant, to avoid an even more sweeping US import ban, agreed to pay \$1.8 billion to settle the dispute.
- **Defeating class certification in Atlanta Beltline** case: A Litigation team in Atlanta secured an important win for the City of Atlanta when it defeated class certification in a case involving the popular Atlanta Beltline project, a former railroad corridor that has been converted into a multi-use public trail. The putative class members claimed ownership of the former railroad property and sought tens of millions of dollars in damages for alleged inverse condemnation and trespass. The trial court denied class certification, finding the plaintiffs had not satisfied any of the statutory requirements, in large part due to the factually intensive inquiry necessitated by the number of and variations in the deeds and other property-rights agreements between the putative class members and the defendants.

- **REIT merger**: A team of lawyers in **Dallas, Kansas City, Atlanta** and **New York** represented a Houston-based REIT in its merger with a Jericho, NY-based REIT. Scheduled to close in the third quarter, the deal will create one of the country's largest grocery-anchored shopping center owners, with 559 open-air centers and mixed-use assets comprising approximately 100 million square feet of gross leasable area. The combined company's equity market capitalization will be about \$12 billion and its enterprise value about \$20.5 billion.
- Big payout in trade secret misappropriation case: A Pennsylvania federal court entered judgment in favor of a Fortune 200 company that manufacturers paints, coatings, and specialty materials, in the amount of US\$26.4 million in damages based on the trade secrets misappropriation claims that a team of Pittsburgh litigators brought against a Chinese competitor and related parties. That figure reflects US\$8.8 million in compensatory damages and US\$17.6 million in punitive damages under the state's trade secrets statute.
- Cannabis-related IPO: A team of lawyers in Chicago, Washington, DC, and New York advised a REIT focused on the state-regulated cannabis sector in connection with its initial public offering of 6.25 million shares on the Nasdaq. The IPO price was \$19 per share, which rose to \$23 by the end of the first day of trading. The team came up with a novel

- legal argument that enabled the cannabis-related company to list, and the work has led to several new engagements for our Cannabis group.
- SPAC merger: A team of lawyers located in New
  York and Short Hills, NJ, represented the majority
  stockholder of a Phoenix-based online platform for
  buying and selling homes in a public offering via a
  \$3 billion SPAC merger with an acquisition company
  led by a serial entrepreneur who co-founded several
  successful real estate technology companies.
- Sale of lodging resort: A team from Phoenix,
  Dallas and Chicago represented a real estate
  investment firm focused on the luxury hospitality
  space, in the \$265 million sale of a 130-room resort
  hotel to a lodging REIT. The 258-acre resort in the
  heart of California's wine country was designed using
  sustainable development practices and situated to
  avoid disturbing the natural landscape. Our client
  retained ownership of the property's residential
  parcels and has already begun constructing homes
  and selling custom homesites that will be affiliated
  with the resort.
- SaaS acquired by health action company: A
  Birmingham team represented a leading SaaS
  platform used by health plans and employers to
  configure and manage consumer engagement
  programs in its sale to the healthcare industry's
  largest health action company.



# **Social Impact**

### Protecting the Right to Vote

In the wake of multiple state initiatives to restrict voting access, Dentons is once again publicly reasserting its commitment to protecting and advancing voting rights throughout the US. The right to vote is a fundamental principle of our democracy, and the Firm believes that fighting to protect and expand it is one of the most important things we in the legal profession can do.

- We have been working visibly with nonprofit Vote at Home, a relationship of Washington, DC, managing associate **Mike Pfeifer**, in Kentucky, Pennsylvania, Georgia and additional states across the country through our Dentons 50 network colleagues.
- At the federal level, our advocacy team led by Mike McNamara and Washington, DC, principals John Russell and Sander Lurie are working to advance passage of HR 1, the For the People Act of 2021. This bill expands automatic and same-day voter registration, as well as vote-by-mail and early voting, nationwide. It also limits removing voters from voter rolls, protects election integrity and security, reforms campaign finance laws and strengthens ethics for the three branches of government.
- We convened a webinar on voting rights at which
  Pittsburgh partners Cliff Levine and Alex Lacey
  discussed the cases in Pennsylvania—where Dentons
  successfully defended voting rights before and after
  the November 2020 election—as well as current
  threats to voting rights in Pennsylvania and other states.
- Kansas City Federal Regulatory partner Mark
   Johnson was lead counsel in pivotal voting rights
   litigation in Kansas, including serving as co-lead
   counsel with the ACLU in a successful challenge to
   restrictive voter ID laws.
- Washington Federal Regulatory partner Simon
   Steel co-chairs the Voting Rights Working Group of the Law Firm Antiracism Alliance. He and Chicago Pro Bono partner Ben Weinberg helped organize a program exploring how law firms and companies can advance voting rights and racial justice. Speakers included Equitable Holdings Chief Legal Officer José Ramón González.

Lawyers and professionals in multiple offices
are longtime participants in the nonpartisan Election
Protection program run by the Lawyers Committee
for Civil Rights, which seeks to protect people's right
to vote in national and local elections.

# Advancing Racial Justice Reforms Post-Chauvin Verdict

Just two days after former Minneapolis Officer Derek Chauvin was found guilty of the three charges brought against him in the wake of George Floyd's death, we gathered in Washington, DC, for a Zoom discussion on racial awareness, justice and equity. Washington office Managing Partner Mike Zolandz and Head of Diversity and Inclusion Ada Ejikeme were joined by Executive Director of DC Legal Aid Eric Angel and Executive Director of DC Public Defenders Service Avis Buchanan for a discussion that highlighted some of their experiences working with the most vulnerable and underserved among us and discussed the strengths and weaknesses of our legal system.

### **Expanding Broadband Access**

Philly Community Wireless (PCW) partners with residents, nonprofits and immigrant/limited English proficiency (LEP) communities based network stewardship, with the goal of democratizing broadband access and promoting digital literacy. A Dentons team led by Washington, DC, Federal Regulatory partner **Todd Daubert** handled a pro bono project for the nonprofit collective in connection with its building of community-owned-and-operated Internet infrastructures in North Philadelphia. Todd and managing associate **William Krouse** prepared key documents to protect the data privacy and decrease the liability risk of PCW and its constituent organizations.

### Renter Retaliatory Eviction During COVID-19

Los Angeles counsel Sylvia Chiu and associates Emma Moralyan and Connor Scott negotiated an impressive settlement in a pro bono housing litigation matter on behalf a client who had been forced to vacate an unpermitted housing unit at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. The team won four discovery motions, with \$8,000 in sanctions awarded. With the help of Orange County managing associate **Anne Waddell**, a motion to have requests for admission deemed admitted was also granted in its entirety. Connor took the lead in deposing the two main defendants in the case, artfully eliciting damaging testimony against all four defendants. The team's strategic motion practice also obtained a tentative ruling granting terminating sanctions against all four defendants, which further contributed to the favorable resolution for the client.

  students in this effort.

# Who has inspired you to embrace your diversity, and do you regard that embrace as part of struggle?

My wife, Leah, is an unending source of inspiration and an advocate of living our lives unapologetically. Also, my parents. Small business owners who immigrated to the US from Taiwan shortly before I was born, they have always encouraged me to embrace my diversity and heritage. Ours was one of the only Asian families in the small town in North Carolina where I grew up. That feeling of being an outsider was always a struggle during my adolescence, but it also reinforced my worldview that all of our differences as human beings need to be valued and respected.

### How has being diverse contributed to your success and/or interfered with your progress?

Being diverse has made me more resilient and taught me the importance of tenacity and hard work. Even though we didn't have the advantages of being in the majority, we were expected to do just as well anyway. Growing up as a double minority, Asian and female, even in a large, diverse city like New York, I never thought of it as an asset. Even if I appeared assimilated on the outside, I was keenly aware of my differences from my mostly Caucasian peers. Being viewed as the model minority was both an asset and a disadvantage. I hated being stereotyped. Instinctively, I was drawn to activities outside of school and work that differentiated myself from the stereotype, like playing ice hockey and surfing. I was always a tomboy, which did not fit the stereotype but helped me to fit in when I worked within the maledominated financial services industry. However, that only worked to a certain extent.

While I had at one point a number of Asian women peers professionally, there were usually no Asian women in positions of power to show us it was possible, much less to sponsor, mentor or guide us on how to get there. There was also the culture clash between American ideals of independence, self-promotion, confidence and bravado that were valued in the workplace, but the antithesis of traditionally Asian values of humility, blending in and playing it safe that were touted at home. It's nicer now that we have affinity groups we can identify with and relate to. Dentons' ASAPP Affinity Group is launching its inaugural mentoring program this month, so I'm hopeful that changes for the better are afoot.

### The Future of the LGBTQ Movement



In recognition of the beginning of Pride Month, the popular podcast Talking Feds, hosted by former federal prosecutor Harry Litman, turned over its Sidebar segment to Dentons' own

**Evan Wolfson**, senior counsel, founder of the Freedom to Marry movement and recognized by Time magazine as one of the 100 most influential people in the world. Evan provided his thoughts on the future of the LGBTQ movement. The following is a transcript of his remarks.

"Since we won the Freedom to Marry in 2015, our work to win marriage has proven to be the gift that keeps on giving. Public support has grown every single year since the victory, as people have seen with their own eyes, families helped and no one hurt. We now have a majority of even Republicans and nearly every religious group, and more than 1.1 million gay people have gotten married in the United States.

"But epic as this transformation is, there's still so much more to do. On defense, we need to block the attacks that we're seeing, waves of anti-gay and anti-trans legislation in state legislatures, as well as abuses in other parts of the country. We've seen an effort to use so-called religious exemptions to try to carve out licenses to discriminate from the gains we have won. And with the right wing solidly in control of a packed Supreme Court, there may very well be bad decisions that will erode some of the gains we've made, and that we will have to fight to correct. On the affirmative, of course, winning marriage, while important, is not the only arena of life that matters.

"We want to secure the Equality Act, federal civil rights legislation that will cement protections on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity that will help all Americans, not only in the areas of employment, public accommodations and housing, but in credit, in education and so much more. And we need to see similar bills enacted at state legislatures. And of course, we don't just want nondiscrimination laws, we don't just want good laws. We want good lives. We need to send a message of affirmation and support to every person: young or old, gay or non-gay, trans or non-trans, no matter what part of the country they live in, and no matter what area of life they're daring to dream big in. We want people to be secure and able to pursue happiness, the American dream.

"So we have a lot of work to do. Fortunately in this work, the marriage lift and marriage conversation, the marriage advance has brought ever more allies and assets into the work, businesses and others standing with the LGBT community as we fight to get our country where it needs to be. Plenty more to do, but lots to celebrate."

### What is your advice for less experienced LGBTQ+ colleagues?

I recently read *Begin Again: James Baldwin's America and Its Urgent Lessons for Our Own*, by Eddie S. Glaude, Jr., in which Glaude quotes Baldwin speaking to a group of young civil rights activists at Howard University in 1963: "I'll make you a pledge. If you will promise...that you will never, ever accept any of the many derogatory, degrading and reductive definitions that this society has ready for you, then I, Jimmy Baldwin, promise you I shall never betray you."

A prestigious writer, Baldwin was speaking from a position of relative power for a Black, gay man when he declared he would never align himself with the even-more powerful against those they oppress. It's a promise I think we LGBTQ+ folks who have a relative degree of power in a still deeply unjust and often cruel society should also make. Let's not mistake relative privilege for universal justice; comfort for liberation. The people who won what measure of progress we've made did so by afflicting the comfortable. Stonewall was a response to police brutality. ACT UP was a response to political and corporate callousness. The same forces that oppressed our predecessors are still at work today. Those of us fortunate enough not to feel that oppression directly or daily should promise to never betray those who do.

### **In Memoriam**

It is with great sadness that we mark the recent passing of two current and two former members of the Firm.



Retired partner **CHARLIE BIRD** passed peacefully after a years-long battle with leukemia. Charlie was the heart and soul of Luce Forward—our San Diego-based legacy firm that in 2012 combined its practices with McKenna Long & Aldridge. At Luce, he served in many senior roles, including as a member of the Executive Committee, General Counsel, and as the chief architect of the strategic planning effort that eventually led to the merger with McKenna Long.

Charlie was also the one of the best appellate lawyers in California, and over the years he served as a mentor to just about every lawyer who joined the Firm. A fellow and director of the American Academy of Appellate Lawyers and a member and past president of the California Academy of Appellate Lawyers, he argued civil cases in the Supreme Court; US Courts of Appeals for the Federal, Sixth, Ninth and Tenth Circuits; the California Supreme Court; and California's six intermediate appellate districts. More than 60 of his cases were decided in officially published opinions. He also represented the City of San Diego in a series of challenges to the bond financings for San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium (now SDCCU Stadium), the San Diego Convention Center and Petco Park. The city succeeded in all the cases.



**RICK FENTON**'s sudden, unexpected and premature passing at 67, left a huge void in our lives and in our hearts. A dedicated and tenacious pillar of our Chicago Litigation team for over 40 years, losing Rick in the vibrancy of his career during these remote times was all the more difficult as he has held a position of such influence and importance within our Chicago office, litigation practice and across the Firm.

Rick litigated, in both trial and appellate courts, a wide variety of commercial disputes, including securities, product liability, ERISA, antitrust, RICO and consumer class action defense, executive compensation and employment litigation, fiduciary liability, misappropriation of trade secrets and proprietary information, insurance coverage, insurance bad faith and general business and real estate litigation. He also represented clients in regulatory and internal investigations in the securities, employee benefit and corporate governance areas, and in mediation and arbitration proceedings.

Rick's training, sponsoring, mentoring and guiding of lawyers at every point in their careers inspired countless advocates to achieve the exacting talent and unrelenting passion he himself brought to all his client and pro bono work. Long admired as a leader in the bar—especially within the insurance industry, where clients chose him time after time as the voice of the industry and a voice of reason, in and out of court. His client roster—Allstate, McDonald's, Prudential, Sears, Simon Properties, and dozens more—mirrored the storied history of our Firm's heritage, just as his many victories contributed to its then and future success.



**CLAY LONG** succumbed at 85 to a months-long struggle with multiple system atrophy. Born during the Great Depression in rural Alabama, Clay graduated at the top of his class from Harvard Law School and went on to clerk for Supreme Court Justice Hugo Black, where he assisted in authoring the majority opinion in *Gideon v. Wainwright*. He began his private practice at Sutherland Asbill & Brennan (now Eversheds), where he was mentored by Randolph Thrower,

a future Commissioner of the IRS. In 1974 Clay and fellow Sutherland associates John Aldridge and Bill Stevens formed the firm that would later become known as Long Aldridge & Norman, serving as chair of Long Aldridge and, later, McKenna Long & Aldridge until 2005.


Clay's long history of civic involvement in Atlanta set a high standard for Dentons. His community engagements focused on the environment, though he was also a strong supporter of legal aid to underserved communities. Clay chaired the Boards of the Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority (MARTA), the Georgia Conservancy, the Nature Conservancy in Georgia, Greenspace Commissions (under two governors, during which he led the drafting of Georgia's first greenspace protection plan), the United Way of Metropolitan Atlanta and the Jekyll Island Foundation. He was also a member of Georgia Governor Zell Miller's Commission on Economy in State Government, a Fellow of the American Bar Foundation, and recipient of the Atlanta Bar Association's first Leadership Award. Clay was named the Georgia Conservancy's Distinguished Conservationist and Georgia Trend magazine named him one of "The 100 Most Influential Georgians," citing his work as an avid environmentalist and preservationist and describing him as a "master architect of the politically influential firm's strategic growth and direction."



**LENORA WALKER PATE**, a shareholder in the Birmingham office's Health Care practice, passed away peacefully at 72, surrounded by her loving family. In 1985, Lenora, then a single mother of two, graduated summa cum laude and salutatorian from Samford University's Cumberland School of Law. Soon thereafter the former school teacher began working at Sirote & Permutt, where she would remain for over 35 years—and where she met the love of her life, shareholder

Steven Brickman. They married in 1987 and were devoted partners in life, law and love for over 33 years.

Lenora's achievements include her appointment to Governor Jim Folsom's cabinet in 1994, becoming the state's first woman Director of the Department of Industrial Relations; running for Governor in 1998 (the first woman to do so since Lurlene Wallace in the 1960s); countless professional awards and recognitions (including *Best Lawyers'* "Health Care Lawyer of the Year" in 2016 and 2021; "Best Lawyer in America" for Health Care law for 14 straight years from 2007-21; and *Birmingham News'* "Top Five Most Influential Lawyers" in 1999; serving as chair of the Alabama Citizens for Constitutional Reform from 2003-20; and playing an playing an integral role in the development of the University of Alabama at Birmingham's Kirklin Clinic.



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
