

Plans to reopen states



- **Alabama:** Plans to allow restaurants and some businesses to reopen after the state's stay at home order expires at the end of the month.
- Florida: Part of the coalition of six southern states coordinating to reopen their economies: Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Florida, South Carolina, and Tennessee
- **Georgia:** Gov. Brian Kemp introduced plans "to incrementally and safely reopen sectors" of the economy based on optimistic numbers from the Department of Public Health.
- **Mississippi:** Gov. Tate Reeves said his state plans to ease restrictions on some businesses next Monday.
- **South Carolina:** Gov. Henry McMaster allowed some stores to reopen Monday afternoon. They will be allowed to open at 20 percent capacity, or five people per 1,000 square feet.
- **Tennessee:** Stay-at-home order expires on April 30 "with the vast majority of businesses in 89 counties allowed to re-open on May 1."
- **Texas:** Series of executive orders have been issued to begin the process of reopening.
- **Vermont:** Gov. Phil Scott announced that Vermont would adopt a phased approach to reopening the state.

States not currently under stay-at-home order: Arkansas, Iowa, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Utah and Wyoming
