	Canada's decision to break from the consensus-based OECD/G20 process to implement its own Digital Services Tax imperils Canada's trade ties with the United States. With the USMCA review on the horizon, bombastic U.S. election rhetoric on trade already in play, and much of Canada's future economic development linked to cooperation with the White House, Canada can ill afford a trade battle with the U.S. right now, especially one where the economic gains are inconclusive. A longtime Canada-US economic observer, Dawson's remarks will explore the challenges of Canadian internet regulation on the broader bilateral relationship and strategies for durable and effective policymaking.
