### Global Situation Update: April 2, 2021

#### WHAT WE'RE WATCHING

Ukraine's security situation is deteriorating as Russia conducts large force buildups near the Ukrainian border and in Crimea. US national security officials are monitoring an escalation of armed confrontation in Eastern Ukraine and have held several calls with their counterparts in Kiev over the past several days.



Four Ukrainian were killed by shelling by Russian forces last week in Eastern Ukraine, marking a significant escalation of hostilities.



## Global

# Confirmed cases of coronavirus surpassed 129.5 million with 2.8 million deaths.

- People around the world see climate change
  as a major threat on par with the spread of
  infectious diseases, and a greater threat than
  terrorism, cyber attacks, nuclear proliferation,
  economic woes and mass migration. according
  to data from Pew Research Center.
- According to the World Economic Forum, which keeps an index on "gender parity" in 156 countries, the pandemic may set women back by a whole generation by forcing more women out of the workforce, deepening their load of uncompensated labor, leaving them more vulnerable to domestic violence.

## **COVID-19 Vaccine**

British regulators said they have identified 30 cases of rare blood clot events after the use of the AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine, 25 more than the agency previously reported.

- The German vaccine commission recommended that those under 60 do not receive a second dose of the AstraZeneca vaccine.
- Australia is reviewing a blood clot case in man who received AstraZeneca vaccine.
- Vietnam received its first Covax delivery, 811,000 doses of AstraZeneca vaccines.

- Pfizer-BioNTech shared that their vaccine was 91 percent effective in updated trials including the South African variant.
- The US Food and Drug Administration authorized two revisions to Moderna's coronavirus vaccine, allowing it to provide additional doses from each vial.



## **COVID-19 Vaccine**


Globally, 617.03 doses of vaccine have been administered.

The head of the African CDC said that India's decision to temporarily halt the export of AstraZeneca vaccines will be "disastrous" for the continent's vaccination efforts. However, Africa is not the only continent being left behind.

## Markets & Business

# A number of companies including Unilever and L'Oreal are working on labels that will show products' carbon footprints.

- **The S&P 500** hit a new record above 4,000 on Thursday, powered higher by tech shares.
- **Copper** prices have fallen some 7 percent from February highs, as part of a broader retreat from speculative trading positions.
- Coinbase Global Inc, the largest US cryptocurrency exchange, has received approval from the US Securities and Exchange Commission to list its shares on the Nasdaq.

- **United Airlines** will start hiring pilots again in May as travel demand picks up in the US.
- OPEC+ agreed to gradually increase output starting in May.
- As fallout from the **Archegos** scandal continues, calls are growing for tougher regulations on swap trades.



## **Africa**

French Defense Minister Parly met with Malian transitional
 President N'Daw in Bamako after the UN reported that French airstrikes in the country had killed civilians, contradicting French accounts.

- The UN called on **Somali** leaders to break the impasse that has delayed scheduled elections for over a month.
- South Africa will shut liquor stores over Easter weekend to discourage gatherings.







## Asia

 Hong Kong will resume use of Pfizer-BioNTech vaccines after a new batch arrives on April 5.

Malaysia's Prime Minister announced that fully vaccinated
 Malaysians may be allowed to travel freely across the country.

India's government asked refiners to speed up diversification and reduce dependence on the Middle East, days after OPEC+ said it would maintain production cuts. India has pushed back deadlines for coal-fired power plants to adopt new emission norms by up to three years.

• The **Myanmar** military junta suspended wireless internet access in the country. Deposed Myanmar leader Aung Suu Kyi was charged with breaking an official secrets law. Another thousand Myanmar refugees fled across the border into Thailand Thursday following a military attack in Karen (aka Kayin) state. Across the country, demonstrators held "flower strikes," leaving bouquets, some with defiant slogans, at locations like bus stops, where activists were killed by security forces.



## Europe

 Right-wing populist leaders from Hungary, Poland and Italy met on Thursday to discuss a "European resistance" political bloc.

• **Dutch** Prime Minister Rutte's chances of forming a new government were dealt a serious blow on Friday, as parliament passed a formal motion of disapproval, saying he had not told the truth about remarks made during government formation talks.

- Most EU countries voted to share portions of upcoming vaccine
  deliveries with Bulgaria, Croatia, Estonia, Latvia and Slovakia, the five countries most in need; Austria, Slovenia and Czechia
  were excluded from the deal.
- Turkey's trade deficit shrunk last month as exports rose more than 42 percent from a year earlier.
- Weekly COVID-19 infections fell across the **UK**, per a national statistics survey. Up to 3,500 guests will be allowed to attend the May 2021 Eurovision Song Contest, in a vote of confidence for the viability of large-scale events despite Europe's resurgence of COVID-19.



## Middle East

The IAEA reported that Iran had begun enriching uranium with a fourth cluster of advanced machines at the Natanz plant.
 Representatives of China, France, Germany, Russia, the UK and Iran will meet by video today to discuss the US' possible return to the Iran nuclear agreement.

Kuwait will extend its overnight curfew to April 22.

Qatar ordered the suspension of in-person learning.

The Israeli defense ministry reported that it was investigating a potentially sensitive
deal that an Israeli firm had signed with a Chinese counterpart without the government's
knowledge.

Next week, Germany will present Beirut with a proposal to reconstruct areas destroyed by August's port explosion, dependent
on Lebanese leaders agreeing to form a government. The Lebanese Central Bank said it would meet with Alvarez & Marsal to
discuss a forensic audit, a process which the IMF requires for further support but has been unsuccessful several times. In a
leaked video, top Lebanese Christian cleric was unusually critical of Hizballah, saying the group is "not looking out for the interest
of [the Lebanese] people."

## **Americas**

- **Brazil's** Sao Paulo accelerated efforts to exhume old graves to make space for a growing number of COVID-19 burials. Brazil posted a smaller-than-expected trade surplus in March of \$1.5 billion. Board members for state-owned Banco do Brasil SA released a public statement arguing that President Bolsonaro's nominee for bank CEO is not ready for the job.
- Despite having one of the world's fastest vaccination programs, Chile saw cases surpass 1 million, and accordingly shut down its borders and tightened strict lockdown measures.
- Ontario, Canada will enter a third lockdown. New federal data showed that over 1,000 passengers arrived in Canada infected with COVID-19, despite pre-flight testing requirements. A new poll from Research Co. Found that more than half of Canadians support a boycott of the 2022 Beijing Olympic games.








## **Americas**

While Brazil's COVID-19 outbreak is drawing the most international attention, neighboring countries, Argentina, Colombia and Peru, are experience strong third waves of new infections, driven by the more infectious Brazilian variant. Argentina has reported more than 10,000 daily new cases over the past 4 days; yesterday, Peru and Colombia also reported more than 10,000 new infections.







## **Americas: US**

Nationally, 99.6 million people have received one or more vaccine doses, 30 percent of
the total population. CVS pledged to help accelerate US vaccine rollout, saying it has
issued over 10 million shots. Virginia will expand coronavirus vaccine eligibility to
everyone age 16 and over who lives or works in the state by April 18.

- The FDA authorized the first COVID-19 test that can be used at home and repeatedly.
- New weekly jobless claims rose again to 719,000 last week.
- A measure of US manufacturing activity growth jumped in March to its highest level since 1983.
- Treasury officials said they could refuse to buy IMF special drawing rights (SDRs) from countries whose policies oppose US strategic interests, a move aimed to fend of Republican criticism that SDR plans could aid US adversaries to access hard currency.



#### **Country in Focus: Brazil**

As Brazil experiences an intense wave of COVID-19, a reshuffle in the Bolsonaro administration, and the onset of pre-2022 electoral politics, the country has entered a period of heightened risk and uncertainty. Most pressingly, Brazil is experiencing a severe outbreak of COVID-19, with cases and deaths outpacing anything seen in the country during 2020.

The month of March saw over 65,000 COVID-19 deaths – more than double the previous monthly record – and pushed health systems over capacity in 16 states. Vaccinations are proceeding at a slow pace, with only 7% of Brazilians having received the shot, while the P1 variant of international concern has become predominant in parts of the country. Though the government has secured agreements for over 560 million doses (more than enough to immunize its population of 210 million), supplies have been slow to arrive. The latest wave of COVID-19 and shortcomings of the country's vaccination drive adds to volatility in the country's political space and backlash against the President Bolsonaro's handling of the pandemic.

This week, Brazil stepped deeper into political instability after President Bolsonaro replaced almost a third of his cabinet in a major reshuffle. Though the reshuffle had some pragmatic policy roots (namely replacing former foreign minister Abdo Benítez, who faced broad backlash over the failures of Brazil's vaccination campaign), the move overall served to reinforce President Bolsonaro's control of the government through appointing allies in key positions. In particular, the removal of defense minister General Fernando Azevedo e Silva prompted strong backlash; on March 30, one day

after General Azevedo's removal, the chiefs of Brazil's army, navy and air force all resigned, expressing concerns about Bolsonaro's politicization of the armed forces. Azevedo was replaced by another former general, Bolsonaro's former Chief of Staff Walter Braga Netto. With the resignation of the three chiefs of Brazil's armed forces, Bolsonaro also has the opportunity to appoint their successors, potentially shaking up the military's chain of command.

The cabinet reshuffle underlines Brazil's political volatility as the Bolsonaro administration nears the end of its first term. As the president faces backlash for a COVID-19 situation that is spiraling out of control while looking ahead to October 2022 elections, heightened uncertainty surrounds the direction of government policy in a number of areas. Bolsonaro's pattern of cycling through health ministers (the country is on its fourth health minister since the start of the pandemic) points to persistent challenges in COVID-19 policymaking — particularly given Bolsonaro's own infamously controversial approach to the virus. Beyond pandemic response, moves like Bolsonaro's ouster of the former Petrobras CEO in favor of a political ally (and former army general) have heightened

concerns that populist instincts will become more prominent in President Bolsonaro's decisions as elections draw closer. While the Bolsonaro administration's pro-business stance is expected to remain unchanged by the cabinet reshuffle, heightened risks from unpredictable policy and unstable politics will weigh on the country's business environment.

Beyond political shakeup within the Bolsonaro administration and a severe resurgence of COVID-19, the recent re-emergence of former left-wing President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva (commonly known as Lula) as a likely presidential candidate alters the outlook for 2022 elections. Since corruption charges against him were annulled on March 8, Lula's rhetoric at public appearances has given the distinct impression he intends to run against Bolsonaro, whose election in 2018 came after corruption charges caused Lula, the then-favorite for president, to be barred from elections. Lula has yet to confirm any intention to run, and it remains uncertain how much his former popularity has been dented by years of corruption scandals surrounding his party. However, momentum for Lula's cause was recently boosted by another court ruling. On March 23, Brazil's



Supreme Court ruled that former judge Sergio Moro was biased in his oversight of Lula's corruption trial, which Lula's supporters see as vindication of longstanding claims of political persecution. Moro's role at the head of corruption investigating "Operation Car Wash" gained him national stature and significant public respect - though his later decision to join Bolsonaro's administration would cast doubt

on his political impartiality (Moro ultimately resigned from government in April 2020 over a clash with Bolsonaro). With the Supreme Court's ruling at his back and Bolsonaro mired in another COVID-19 crisis, Lula looks well positioned for a comeback.






As of 2100 hours US EDT on April 1, 2021






